A Message From Your Superintendent



Dear Resident.

This edition of The Banner includes information about the 2017-2018 school budget and capital improvement projects that will address important upgrades to the facility. It also serves to update you on a number of topics including candidates seeking re-election to the Board of Education, a new shared service beginning in July, and a special note of thanks to the devoted service of district employees who have retired during the school year or will be retiring on June 30, 2017.

On May 16, 2017 eligible District residents will have the option to vote on the proposed expenditure budget as Proposition #1.

Proposition #1: The school board is presenting an expenditure budget of \$17,098,307 which represents a 5.00% decrease in spending compared to 2016–2017. This is the fifth consecutive year in which the expenditure

budget has been decreased to reflect the declining enrollment and funding.

The budget proposes a 2.0% increase to the tax levy which is well below the allowable tax cap. Since its enactment in 2013, the District has maintained tax levy increases below the NYS tax cap. Even with significant spending reductions, the proposed levy increase will help to slow the rate of withdrawal from the reserve accounts. The use of reserve accounts is necessary to maintain tax levy increases below the cap and to balance the budget.

As part of the proposed 2017–2018 budget, the District is also planning a Capital Outlay project. New York State permits districts to pursue small capital improvement projects (not to exceed \$100,000 per year). These projects are more simplified than the typical Capital Improvement Projects in that they receive voter approval via the general fund budget and have a streamlined New York State Education Department (NYSED) approval process. In addition, the State will reimburse the District at the building aid rate in the following year. The current proposal is to use the approved funds to pay for upgrades to the Herbert F. Ludwig Auditorium such as new seating and lighting. Capital Outlay projects are a useful way to address smaller scale improvements.

In May 2016, District residents approved the release of \$1.9M from the capital reserve fund for large-scale facility improvements. Following bid advertisements and awarding of contracts, the State Education Department has issued building permits for new roof installation, replacement of selected exterior doors and hardware, replacement of physical education lockers in the high school, and concrete work at the elementary, middle and high school entrances. The majority of construction will take place during the summer of 2017.

The District continues to seek out cost sharing and consolidation opportunities in order to offset increasing costs. The shared superintendent model will continue for a fifth year and a new endeavor involves a shared cafeteria manager. Mrs. Julie Fuerch, will begin her role as shared cafeteria manager serving the Barker and Roy-Hart school districts on July 1, 2017. In addition to the merged football and wrestling programs, Mr. Matthew Sweeney will continue to serve as the Agriculture Education teacher for each district.

One shared service that will be discontinued is the Director of Technology. The Smart Schools funding has allowed the District to employ additional laptops, Chromebooks, and interactive (Clear Touch) panels. To support the effective integration of these tools, it will be necessary that Mr. James Luckman, currently serving as the shared Director of Technology, return to his full-time status at Barker with the 2017–2018 school year.

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Two candidates are seeking re-election on the school board of education. Incumbents John Sweeney will seek his third term and Louis Mead will seek his fifth term. Candidate bios can be found on page 5.

Proposition #1: BUDGET

Shall the Board of Education be authorized to spend the sum of \$17,098,307 in the total amount set forth in the proposed budget during the 2017–2018 school year and to levy the necessary tax.

Candidates for Board of Education

The Barker Board of Education has two vacant seats for the 2017–2018 school board election. Each seat has a three-year term. The candidates that returned petitions are listed here in the order they will appear on the ballot:

Mr. John E. Sweeney, Jr.

I am a 1978 graduate of Barker Central School and a 1980 graduate of Alfred Ag and Tech with a degree in Animal Husbandry. After graduating from Alfred Ag and Tech in 1980, I came home to work on the 107-year old family owned Maple View Dairy. I am presently the co-owner of the West Somerset Road farm. I am a member of the Upstate Niagara Milk Cooperative, the Niagara County Farm Bureau, a trustee of the Barker Alumni Association and President of Cornell Cooperative Extension.

My wife Deborah and I have three children: Matthew 24, and Christopher 20, who are graduates of BCS and Melanie 18, who is attending the Orleans Learning Center. Our family members have received numerous awards in 4-H including the Family of the Year in 2003. I was the recipient of the 4-H Leader of the Year in 1988 and the Distinguished Service Award in 4-H in 1995. My wife and I received the Extra Miler Award from Faith United Methodist Church in 2005. I was honored to be a recipient of the Unsung Hero

Qualifications of a Voter

You qualify as a voter if:

You are a citizen of the United States; you have been a resident of the Barker Central School District for at least 30 days prior to the school budget vote on Tuesday, May 16, 2017; you are at least eighteen (18) years of age; you are qualified to register for an election in accordance with Section 5-106 of the Election Law. (NOTE: You are not required to be a registered voter in the general election or to have cast a vote in any such election. You must, however, be qualified or eligible to register to vote. In addition, you do not have to be a property owner to be eligible to vote.)






High School Art Students' Work Featured in Several Shows





International Club Travels to Italy



Members of the International Club recently experienced the beauty and culture of Italy. Seventeen students from Barker traveled to Isis Mattei Latisana School of Tourism during the spring break. Accompanied by their "classmates" the students toured the cities of Venice, Udine, Cividale del Friuli and Trieste before venturing off Florence and Rome.

The Italian school is located in a seaside resort area near the Adriatic sea. The water is a major resource which

influences the types of small businesses. Our students learned about differences in the way Italian student are educated. For example, Italian students take five years of high school and attend school six days per week. The Italian students all spoke English at various
