A Letter from the Board of Education President, Randall B. Atwater

May 2020

Dear BCS district residents:

I write to you during a period of great stress and challenges for our families, communities, schools, states and nation. The Barker Central School administration and staff have worked tirelessly to make the best of a difficult situation and to serve the educational and nutritional needs of our students to the best of their ability with today's constraints.

While the future is cloudy in many ways, we have prepared a budget for the 2020-2021 school year as presented herein. Bottom line, the expenditure budget is down slightly (0.1%) from the current school year. The district continues to utilize the best possible budgeting practices to ensure we are spending taxpayer funds in ways that provide the greatest return for our students and community. Your school board and administration have designed a budget to continue the current instructional offerings for all of our students. If we made deeper cuts to our overall spending plan, we would have to eliminate offerings for students and/or drive up class sizes significantly.

The changes the district made for the current school year have resulted in increased efficiencies as planned. These changes include the single bus run and the unified district schedule and reduced staffing wherever feasible.

Our school tax levy for the 2020-2021 school year is proposed to increase by 2%, not including changes due to the power plant. While the numbers on the enclosed budget notice look much higher, this is due to the fact that the power plant is no longer projected to be on a PILOT and as such will return to the general tax levy. We do not know the exact impact upon the tax rates as that is completely dependent upon the changes to the power plant and how it is assessed. The final tax rates will not be available until the tax rolls are set and the levy is adopted in August. The BCS district still enjoys one of the lowest school tax rates in the Niagara/Orleans BOCES area.

No matter what, our main financial issue as we look forward is our revenues from the state. As you know, the power plant has now permanently shut down. While revenues from the plant have decreased steadily over the last 10 years, the aid we



received from the state has not changed significantly over the same time period and has certainly not replaced the lost revenue from the plant. As a result, we have needed to tap our reserves to balance the budget in recent years and next year is no exception. Due to this we have been advocating at the state level and Superintendent Reimer has met personally with numerous state legislators from across the state to ensure that they know who we are, what our issues are, and why fair distribution of state aid is so important. In the future we will be reaching out to all of our community to help with some of these advocacy efforts.

On a brighter note, we have begun work on a solar energy performance contract that has the potential to save the district \$65,000 per year in annual energy costs. This solar panel installation will be about two acres and will not be visible from the road. However, we anticipate that this solar project will nearly offset our annual electricity needs for the district. We are planning to have this system operational in less than a year from now.

Also, based on professional recommendations and input from the community, we are continuing to look at additional capital work that would provide greater energy savings by replacing and/or upgrading our heating, ventilation and cooling systems, and lighting throughout our campus. The school board and administration remain committed to the long-term maintenance, safety and suitability of our campus to provide the efficient sound educational environment our community expects and deserves.

District residents will vote on the following propositions this year

Proposition #1: BUDGET

Shall the Barker Central School District Board of Education, Niagara County, New York be authorized to spend the sum of \$17,254,712 in the total amount set forth in the proposed Budget during the 2020-2021 school year and to levy the necessary tax.

Proposition #2: BOARD MEMBERS - VOTE FOR TWO

You may vote for up to two (2) candidates. There are two (2) seats to be filled on the Board of Education for three-year terms beginning on July 1, 2020 and expiring on June 30, 2023.

The candidates who filed petitions are: Emily Gow, Francisco G. Meza Agüero, and John E. Sweeney, Jr.

Proposition #3: LIBRARY

Shall the funding for the Barker Public Library, which is raised by annual levy of a tax upon the taxable real property within the Barker Central School District be increased \$76,500.00 to \$78,030.00, an additional \$1,530.00.

Proposition #4: LIBRARY TRUSTEE MEMBERS - VOTE FOR ONE (1)

To elect 1 member of the Board of Trustees of the Barker Public Library for a 5 year term, commencing on June 2020. To succeed Roy Anderson whose term will expire on June 2020.

The candidate who filed a petition is: Brian Carmer

Qualifications of a Voter

You qualify as a voter if: you are a citizen of the United States; you have been a resident of the Barker Central School District for at least 30 days prior to the school budget vote and election held on May 21, 2019; you are at least eighteen (18) years of age; you are qualified to register for an election in accordance with Section 5-106 of the Election Law. In addition, you do not need to be a property owner to be eligible to vote.

The Calculated Tax Levy Limit is \$ 6,441,107. The power plant will now be included in the tax rolls and will not have a PILOT payment. This results in an increase to the tax levy and a corresponding decrease in PILOT payments.

Detailed Explanation of Categories

General Support consists of:

 Board of Education, Central Administration, Finance, Staff, and Special Items. This also includes Maintenance and Operation of Plant, (including all maintenance and grounds salaries, supplies & materials, and utilities) and Central Printing/Mailing and Central Data Processing.

Instruction consists of:

 Instructional Administration and Improvement (principal's salary and supply codes, curriculum development, research and planning, and professional development for all professional staff), Teaching Regular School (all regular school teaching salaries, supplies & materials, equipment, textbooks and BOCES services for regular students, including Occupational Education), School Library and Audiovisual, and Computer-Assisted Instruction (Technology), Attendance, Guidance, Health Services, Psychological Services, Extra-classroom Activities, Athletics and Special Education (teacher salaries, supplies & materials, textbooks, CSE and CPSE Committee expenses, contractual costs, private schools tuition, and BOCES special education costs).

Pupil Transportation consists of:

• All bussing and fuel.

Community Service consists of:

• Summer school and the summer recreation program.

Undistributed consists of:

Employer contributions to the employees' retirement system and the teachers' retirement system, social security, workers' compensation, unemployment insurance, health insurance and terminal leave payments. It also includes payments of principal and interest on school bond payments.
