

A Message From Your Superintendent

It feels like we just started the 2019-20 school year just a few weeks ago and yet here we are nearing the middle of the year getting ready for the upcoming Holidays. The entire Barker school community has been hard at work this year and the time has flown by. As always. our students continue to achieve and excel at so many things. It truly is a privilege to watch our growth every single day. Take a look at some of the achievements of our students shown throughout the following pages. There is so much to be proud of in our entire school community.

This is also the time of year that we formally start our annual process of developing a budget for the next school year. While budget development and maintenance is ongoing throughout the year, the next few months are when the actual picture becomes a bit more clear and we fine tune our planning for the next school year and beyond. The Board of Education, Administration, and staff take a



great deal of time and effort to put together a spending plan that will provide the best possible education for our students while being as cost effective as possible.

As you all know, the Somerset Power Plant will be closing soon, pending a final review by the state. While we always held out hope that this day would not come so soon, we have been planning for this well in advance of the actual closure. We will continue to rely upon our well-funded reserves while we work to get back to a truly balanced budget where our new revenues coming in each year will equal what we spend each year.

One major part of this plan will likely need all of our community's support. We have spent countless hours working to understand and educate our local legislators about what is wrong with the New York State Foundation Aid formula (which currently funds approximately half of our annual operating expenses) and why we are not receiving what is due to the Barker community. In the near future we will be reaching out to you to help with our advocacy efforts to right the inequities that are in place at the state level and to help increase the amount of State Foundation Aid we receive so we can continue to provide the best possible education for our students in a way that is affordable for our community. Please be on the lookout for more information about this effort as it rolls out in the next month or two.

Lastly, as the winter begins to ramp up, remember that we have so many opportunities for community members to participate in through the school community. We have many continuing education programs that can be found within this edition of the Banner. And don't forget we have many opportunities for you to support our students throughout the rest of the school year. If you have not been to a swim meet, a boys or girls basketball game, a wrestling meet, a baseball/softball game, one of our many concerts and fine arts events that happen throughout the entire school year, or some of the various community events and fund raisers sponsored by school clubs and activities - please stop in and watch what our students and community are doing. Just check the school calendar on the district webpage to see what is going on! They are all fun for the whole family!

As part of our alignment to a PreK-12 model, students have been hard at work with a peer mentoring program. The "M&M Mentoring Program" pairs upper classmen with younger students for regularly scheduled visits, activities and conversations. This allows many of our younger students to develop another positive relationship with somebody on campus; it also gives our high school students a chance to be a leader and continue to make our school a great place for all students.

Continuing our focus on character education, our Student of the Month

recognitions have been aligned PreK-12 to our HARD WORKER model. Each month, the letters from the acronym are used for a different character trait. For December, the trait is Dependable. It is wonderful for our students, faculty and families to see how children at all age levels demonstrate these positive character traits. The SPARK program for all students in grades PreK-8 continues to bear fruit. Responsibility and kindness are continually touched upon throughout the school day.

Our School Resource Officer program with the Town of Somerset continues to benefit our students. Whether it is during the normal school day or an athletic event, visitors, families and community members are expected to represent Barker in a positive way.

Instructional Services Report

Dear Barker Community,

our students.

While 2019 might be coming to an end, the school year isn't even halfway through. However, in just a few short months, we've accomplished a lot! New this year in Prekindergarten through 8th grade is our SPARK program. Building off the 5th and 6th grade program from last year, SPARK recognizes students' efforts throughout a five week time frame. Every five weeks, grade levels participate in fun activities to recognize students who have met certain criteria such as being responsible and kind. Activities have included a Turkey Trot for PreK, 1st and 3rd grade students; apple activities (donated by Niagara Fresh Fruit Company) for students in PreK through 3rd grade; team building activities and a visit to the Albright Knox Art Gallery for 5th graders; playing in the snow and hot chocolate for 2nd grade;



a visit to Old Fort Niagara and a visit to the Rochester Maker Faire for 4th graders; playing in the snow and a visit to the Discover Central and the Niagara Gorge for 6th graders; as well as roller skating and an ice cream social for 7th and 8th graders. We are excited to be able to offer these amazing opportunities to

Just as our students are hard at work learning, so are our teachers. On October 4th, we ran a district-wide professional development day where we investigated an education framework that leads to increased student learning. On November 20th, we followed this up with two hours of professional development around specific components of this framework. Our goal is to increase student learning and achievement. Staff were able to work with each other and have collegial conversations around what good teaching looks like. In addition, we have begun work around the new English, Math, Social Studies and Science standards. As a faculty, we have looked at the new standards and investigated the changes compared to the 2011 Common Core Learning Standards. We have been discussing how to implement these standards into our curriculum. In the Elementary School, we have researched standards-based grading and looked into switching the entire building to standard-based report cards. This work will continue through the spring and the summer.

The Empire State STEM Learning Network is a statewide, community-led collaborative whose mission is to advance STEM education to prepare all students for success in school, work and life to fuel innovation and economic growth in New York. STEM refers to science, technology, engineering, and mathematics. STEM jobs are the largest growing job sector in the United States. At Barker, we recognize how important STEM can be for our students and are working to incorporate this more into our lessons. Every year WNY STEMHub, our regional Empire State STEM Learning Network, hosts an awards luncheon to recognize schools doing work around teaching STEM. This year, Barker received an award recognizing us as an Emerging STEM School.

It's amazing to think about what we have already accomplished in just a few short months; imagine what 2020 holds for our schools.

I would like to remind everyone of New York State Law regarding firearms, and knives. NYS law states: It is illegal for anyone to discharge any Firearm, Cross Bow or Bow near any School or playground. For firearms discharge has to be more than 500 feet. For a cross bow discharge has to be more than 250 feet and for a bow discharge has to be over 150 feet. This includes target practice.

I would also like to remind readers, according to New York State Law, it is illegal to possess in any public place, street or park, any knife with a blade four (4) inches or longer. It is further forbidden by school regulations to be in possession of any type of knife on school grounds no matter of blade length.




Lions Club Poster Contest Winners

Pratt Elementary 4th Graders to be Published







Important Adult/Community Education Information

- **Doctor's Certificate of Health**: A physical examination is suggested prior to participating in physical fitness classes.
- <u>Eligibility</u>: In general, district residents and non-residents <u>who are 18 years of age or older</u> may enroll. High school students may enroll in any course with instructor approval and parental permission, and the understanding that no credit toward graduation will be granted.
- Senior Citizens: Senior Citizens, residents ages 55 and older, will be provided admission at 50% of the regular fee to all school-sponsored events if they present a Barker Central School District Senior Citizen Card. Non-residents will be required to pay the full admission fee. Registration forms must be submitted. Proof of age is required. In order to take advantage of senior citizen fee discount for courses and some special events, you need a Barker Central School Senior Citizen Card. You may receive this card by coming to the Barker Central School Superintendent's office and registering.
- <u>**Registration**</u>: Mail registration. Early registration protects against having to cancel due to insufficient registration. Please avoid disappointment by enrolling early. Registrants can assume they are officially registered unless notified and should begin attending classes on the scheduled starting date. You may register at the first session of class.
- <u>Is Class Canceled?</u> Whenever school is closed during the day due to inclement weather, no classes will be held that evening. Listen to local radio stations WBEN-AM 930 or WLVL-AM 1340 or TV Channels 2, 4 or 7 for school closings. If inclement weather begins later in the day, listen to local radio stations for announcements. Whenever possible, we will utilize the Blackboard Connect system to notify registered students in the event of a cancellation as noted above. Please be sure to provide a valid phone number for this purpose. Do not call the school. When a class cannot be held due to an illness or for other reasons, it is the instructor's responsibility to see that class members are notified. Canceled classes will be rescheduled by the instructor.
- <u>Material Cost</u>: Additional fees will be charged in classes where textbooks or materials are used. These are to be paid by the second session.
- <u>Refunds</u>: Total refunds will be made only if a class is canceled or filled. Transfer of tuition to another course can be arranged where size of class permits. No transfers after second class meeting. No refunds after classes begin.
