From the Desk of Mr. Carter

Hello Barker CSD families. It is safe to say that this has been a unique, unpredictable and often difficult school year. We thank all of our students and families for your continued support, flexibility and dedication to the District as we continue to navigate through an ever-changing academic year.

As a reminder to all families, if your child is sick, please do not send him or her to school. While the District so far has done a good job of controlling the spread of the Covid-19 virus on the campus, it is not worth the risk of exposure or quarantine. The instructional model allows students to synch into their academic courses if they have to temporarily remain home.

If there is a situation in which the District has to go fully remote, the plan will vary depending on the grade level. Instruction for all ages will still take place Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday:

- PreK will have a set virtual meeting scheduled designed by the instructor.
- Grades K-4 will synch in to their classroom teacher's instruction for a morning meeting, literacy and math blocks, and an end of day meeting.
- Grades 5-6 will synch in for their core academic courses with their three teachers.
- Grades 7-12 will follow their daily schedule and synch in for their academic courses (English, Math, Social Studies, Science & Spanish).
- Special areas will have course specific schedules that work around these academic areas. This could include meeting times on Wednesdays and independent/asynchronous learning.

Please keep in mind that this plan could change due to a variety of factors, including guidance from the State. The school's intention is to stay open for in-person hybrid instruction for as long as we are able.

We also understand that there are points in a family's school year when they may make the decision to transfer their child from the hybrid model to the fully remote model. While this transition is seamless, the move from fully-remote back into the hybrid model is not. The ease of the transition depends on the number of students in rooms and courses; we can only physically fit so many people into a room based on the guidance from the State.

The school is also aware of how an after-hours academic workload can affect a student's and family's home life during this time; this was previously touched on in the "Close the Chromebooks" letter regarding the pause over Thanksgiving. This is especially true at the high school level. Please trust that we are continuing this discussion within our leadership groups. We want to make sure students are still learning the necessary skills and content but doing so in a way that respects the unique aspects of this year.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank and congratulate Mrs. Melissa Bundrock on her new role as Assistant Principal at Starpoint Middle School. She has served as the Instructional Support Specialist for this year and last, and a classroom teacher prior; overall, she has served the Barker students for 14 years. We wish her luck as she moves into the next phase of her career.

Lastly, we can't stress the importance of communication enough. If you have a question, please do not hesitate to reach out to your child's teacher(s), guidance counselor, Mrs. Thibault, Mrs. Bundrock, or myself. Communication is always important, but especially so in this disjointed year.

Thank you for all of your help. We wish you all a healthy holiday season. Merry Christmas and Happy New Year.

From the Desk of Dr. Kramer

Dear Barker Community,

What a year 2020 has been. I don't think anyone would have thought when it started 12 months ago that we'd be finishing the year in the midst of a pandemic and that school would look very different! We thank everyone for partnering with us as we do what's best for our children while following all the guidelines from the New York State Education Department.



Throughout this year, and in years past, I am often asked, "How can I help my

children be better readers?" This is a great question and there are some very easy things you can do at home that will reinforce your child's learning.

- 1. Print Rich Media Homes: First, literacy learning starts before children enter school! Studies have shown that children are learning based on print-rich environments at home. All this means is kids read things they see at home. From identifying letters on cereal boxes to understanding the giant yellow M represents McDonald's, kids are always reading. So, when at home, point out words on boxes. Identify letters with your children on mail or on packages. Getting a lot of Amazon boxes this time of year? Work on letter identification by pointing out the different letters in the word Amazon. Ask kids what sounds go with those letters? While in the car, point out billboards and ask what letters they recognize. Any words they know? What sounds go with those letters? This will reinforce to your children that reading can happen anywhere and everywhere!
- 2. Watching TV: For students who are already identifying letters and letter sounds, consider adding subtitles or closed captioning when they are watching TV. Adding this feature will put the words on the screen for the kids. People can't help but be drawn to print when it is in front of them. If your children are going to watch TV anyway, why not help them read more at the same time?
- 3. Read to your kids. Being read to really does help increase students' reading ability. Kids as early as 9 months old benefit from being read to. Reading to kids exposed them to richer vocabulary than they usually hear from adults who speak to them. If you are struggling to find a book that you think your child would enjoy, reach out to his or her teacher. They would be able to help. Also, reach out to Mrs. Morrow, our librarian, and to the Barker Public Library. They will be able to offer suggestions for good books.
- 4. Ask your child to tell you a story. Write down what they tell you and then read it aloud to them. Point to the words as you read them or point at them as your child reads the story back to you. Have them illustrate and now they've become an author and an illustrator! This doesn't need to be done on anything fancy. Extra paper and a three-ring binder can work.

Parents must return this form to request free meals for delivery by bus to their home. Preordered meals will be delivered on Wednesdays – once a week. Students in Cohorts A & B may receive 3 days meals, students in Cohort C may receive 5 days meals. Parents are responsible to pre-order and be home to receive the meals from the bus from 3:00-4:00 PM.
