A MESSAGE FROM YOUR SUPERINTENDENT

Dear Barker Learning Community,

It is amazing how fast the summer has flown by between the graduation of our 111th class and the start of the 112th school year of the Barker Central School District. This year is going to be one of our best ever and I can't wait to see all of our students riding busses to school and walking through our doors on September 6th.

We have so many great things that have been going on here at school and that will continue on throughout the next couple years. First, our capital improvements are

moving along very well and we are just about done with our major design work. You can find the most up-to-date versions of the designs on our district webpage under the title 'Capital Project.' Our designs have been developed over the last 6 months with various input from many sources and we think what is shown in these drawings will be fantastic improvements for our students and larger community. As I have noted before, the work will occur in two distinct phases. The first phase will see our exterior work, including the multipurpose athletic field, parking lots, and some window replacement, beginning February or March of 2024. We currently expect most aspects of the exterior work done before school starts in the fall of 2024. The second phase will see our interior work begin in May or June of 2024 with completion of all areas of that work not complete until around August 2025. There are a lot of moving parts in this project and our goal is to have as little impact upon daily instruction as possible. We are confident that all the changes coming will have a long-lasting impact on our entire student body and community and we can't wait for these exciting changes to be completed.

I also want to thank our entire community for the thoughtful feedback and input related to the continued efforts in finding a new name and mascot for Barker. This process was not one that we expected to have to do, but it is clear that the love for Barker continues to shine through. We are in the final stages of determining our new name now and we hope to have it finalized very soon.

FROM THE BUSINESS OFFICE

Hello Barker Learning Community.

Welcome to the 2023-2024 school year. As many of you know, I have transitioned to the role of School Business Administrator after serving as the Principal for the past several years. Before we get into the busy school year, I wanted to take this opportunity to review some information regarding school taxes.

The total tax levy for the 2023-2024 school year will be \$5,017,125.00. This is an increase of 2% from last year's tax levy of \$4,918,750. After an engaging budget

development season involving various stakeholders, community input and presentations, and regular monthly work with our Budget Advisory Committee, the Board of Education adopted the levy and voters passed the budget in May. This increase is part of our long planning process as we continue to build for the future.

The next important item is the tax rate. This varies by tax jurisdiction. Each town – Somerset, Hartland, Newfane, Yates and Ridgeway – will each have a different tax rate. The tax rate is based on several pieces of information, most important of which are: the total taxable assessed values of properties in the District; the District's tax levy (above); and the equalization rate for each town. Please note the District only sets the tax levy, not the tax rate.

Tax bills are calculated and printed by Niagara County in mid-August and they will be mailed to you shortly. Tax bills will be arriving in early September. Tax bills are generally due by September 30 each year without penalty. There are a few methods to pay. Bills can be paid via mail, and directions will be included on the bills. Also, the District has a lock box located outside the District Office doors at the 1911 building. Taxpayers can drop their payment in the lockbox and a receipt will be mailed to you. Please note we do NOT take cash payments for security and safety purposes.

Thank you all for your continued support of the District. It is an honor to continue to work here in this school and community in this new role. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to reach out.







PRODUCTION & DESIGN CLASS PROJECT

We had an extremely successful 2022-2023 year in athletics celebrating several championships, winning seasons, scholar-athlete teams, individual scholar-athletes, and sportsmanship team awards. Throughout the past year we also successfully implemented an Athlete of the Week program that is supported by many of our local businesses including Crosby's, The Grain House Eatery and Taphouse, Harris Farms, and the Barker Cafeteria. These

businesses have graciously donated many items weekly and posted pictures within a display of these standout athletes at their locations.

Moving forward into the 2023-2024 year, we have many exciting things in the works and changes in our athletic program that parents, student-athletes, staff, and the entire community should be aware of. We want everyone to know that we are going fully electronic using ArbiterSports/Family ID in creating athlete eligibility. This means that athletes and parents must use the links posted at barkercsd.net to register and submit their seasonal paperwork. These documents will be monitored by our medical staff in determining athlete eligibility.

In addition, over the summer we have installed a 9-basket disc golf course on campus. The baskets have been installed with temporary tee boxes for use by everyone this fall. Mr. Mallon and his classes will be working throughout the year to create permanent signage to thoroughly mark out the course, including the hole number, distance, par number, and picture of the hole. In the fall of 2024, permanent tee boxes will be installed.

This year we will stop using paper copies of our extracurricular handbook, health forms, and transportation waiver. Instead, we will be using Family ID as an electronic way to collect and track these documents. You must register with Family ID using the link provided on the school's homepage. Here, you will find simple step-by-step instructions on how to register, along with all of the necessary documents to be filled out and submitted for your child to be eligible to participate in sports. All future sports sign-ups will be through Family ID and you will track their progress in the eligibility process through this account. As in the past, please familiarize yourself with the extracurricular handbook, which has modifications for the 2023-2024 school year, and agree to follow the procedures and regulations by submitting an electronic signature within Family ID. You will also find a tab to fill out and submit your mandatory health history forms. These documents should be submitted after an up-to-date yearly physical is on file with the health office. Lastly, there is a transportation waiver that you may elect to fill out if your child participates in a sport that is combined with another school or has practice/contests off campus regularly. This will allow your child to drive themselves to these events. See the extracurricular handbook under the athletics transportation section for all the rules concerning this opportunity.

The extracurricular handbook now has language to include not only athletics but all students involved in after-school clubs and activities, as it was originally intended. Parents, students, coaches, and teachers should look closely at the changes to the Academic Plan, School Attendance, Practice/Game Attendance, and Transportation Policies. These changes have been put in place for convenience purposes and to be more consistent with enforcing school policies, with an understanding that flexibility may be used in extenuating circumstances. Thank you for taking the time to read and understand these new procedures. I can assure you that once you have registered, it will make the future eligibility process much easier for everyone involved. I look forward to working with your child to help them reach their full potential as a student-athlete.

Lastly, we will be working with the school cafeteria in offering a reward to all student-athletes that are recognized as being part of a scholar-athlete team. At the end of each season, these athletes will have the opportunity to enjoy a special breakfast that is provided for them from the Barker Cafeteria. We would like to thank Julie Fuerch for this unique opportunity in celebrating these hard-working student-athletes.

I look forward to the upcoming school year where we will continue to work hard for the community in establishing a new mascot and logo, finish the details of building the new turf athletic facility, and watch our student-athletes succeed in numerous ways. 

Letter to Parents for School Meal Programs

Dear Parent/Guardian:

Children need healthy meals to learn. Barker Jr/Sr High 7-12 offers healthy meals every school day. Breakfast costs \$1.75; lunch costs \$2.50. Your children may qualify for free meals or for reduced price meals. Students in New York State that are approved for reduced price meals will receive breakfast and lunch meals at no charge. Below are common questions and answers to help you with the application process.

1. **DO I NEED TO FILL OUT AN APPLICATION FOR EACH CHILD?** No. Complete one Application for Free and Reduced Price School Meals to apply for free or reduced price meals for all students in your household attending this School Food Authority. We cannot approve an application that is not complete, so be sure to fill out all required information as indicated on the application and application instructions. **Return the completed application to: Barker Central School Attn: Julie Fuerch 1628 Quaker Rd Barker NY 14012.**

2. WHO CAN GET FREE MEALS?

- All children in households receiving benefits from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR) or Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF), are eligible for free meals. Categorical eligibility for free meal benefits is extended to all children in a household when the application lists an Assistance Program's case number for any household member
- Foster children that are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court are eligible for free meals.
- Children participating in their school's Head Start Program are eligible for free meals.
- Children who meet the definition of homeless, runaway, or migrant are eligible for free meals. Households with children who meet the
 definition of homeless, runaway or migrant should contact the SFA for assistance in receiving benefits.
- Children may receive free meals if your household's gross income is within the free or reduced price limits on the Federal Income Eligibility
 Guidelines. Students in New York State that are approved for reduced price meals will receive breakfast and lunch meals and snacks served
 through the Afterschool Snack Program at no charge.
- Your children may qualify for free or reduced price meals if your household income falls at or below the limits on this chart:

- 3. CAN FOSTER CHILDREN GET FREE MEALS? Yes, foster children that are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court, are eligible for free meals. Any foster child in the household is eligible for free meals regardless of income. Foster children may also be included as a member of the foster family if the foster family chooses to also apply for benefits for other children. Including children in foster care as household members may help other children in the household qualify for benefits. If non-foster children in a foster family are not eligible for free or reduced price meal benefits, an eligible foster child will still receive free benefits.
- 4. CAN HOMELESS, RUNAWAY, AND MIGRANT CHILDREN GET FREE MEALS? Yes, children who meet the definition of homeless, runaway, or migrant qualify for free meals. If you haven't been told your children will get free meals, please call or e-mail Shelly Kordish, 716-795-3000 Ext 3193 to see if they qualify.
- 5. SHOULD I FILL OUT AN APPLICATION IF I RECEIVED A LETTER THIS SCHOOL YEAR SAYING MY CHILDREN ARE APPROVED FOR FREE MEALS? Please read the letter you got carefully and follow the instructions. Call the school at 716-795-3347 if you have questions.
- 6. MY CHILD'S APPLICATION WAS APPROVED LAST YEAR. DO I NEED TO FILL OUT ANOTHER ONE? Yes. Your child's application is only good for that school year and carried over for the first 30 operating days of this school year (or until a new eligibility determination is made, whichever comes first). You must send in a new application unless the school told you that your child is eligible for the new school year. If you do not send in a new application that is approved by the school or you have not been notified that your child is eligible for free meals, your child will be charged the full price for meals.

- 7. I GET WOMEN, INFANTS AND CHILDREN (WIC) BENEFITS. CAN MY CHILD(REN) GET FREE MEALS? Children in households participating in WIC may be eligible for free or reduced price meals. Please fill out an Application for Free and Reduced Price School Meals.
- 8. WILL THE INFORMATION I GIVE BE CHECKED? Yes. We may also ask you to send written proof of the household income you report.
- 9. **IF I DON'T QUALIFY NOW, MAY I APPLY LATER?** Yes, you may apply at any time during the school year. For example, children with a parent or guardian who becomes unemployed or who experiences financial hardship mid-year may become eligible for free and reduced price meals if the household income drops below the income limit.
- 10. WHAT IF I DISAGREE WITH THE SCHOOL'S DECISION ABOUT MY APPLICATION? You should talk to school officials. You also may ask for a hearing by calling or writing to: Michael Carter, School Business Administrator, 1628 Quaker Rd Barker NY 14012.
- 11. MAY I APPLY IF SOMEONE IN MY HOUSEHOLD IS NOT A U.S. CITIZEN? Yes. You, your child(ren), or other household members do not have to be U.S. citizens to qualify for free or reduced price meals.
- 12. WHO SHOULD I INCLUDE AS MEMBERS OF MY HOUSEHOLD? You must include all people living in your household, related or not (such as grandparents, other relatives, or friends) who share income and expenses. You must include yourself and all children living with you. If you live with other people who are economically independent (for example, people who you do not support, who do not share income with you or your children, and who pay a pro-rated share of expenses), do not include them.
- 13. WHAT IF MY INCOME IS NOT ALWAYS THE SAME? List the amount that you normally receive. For example, if you normally make \$1000 each month, but you missed some work last month and only made \$900, put down that you made \$1000 per month. If you normally get overtime, include it, but do not include it if you only work overtime sometimes. If you have lost a job or had your hours or wages reduced, use your current income.
- 14. WE ARE IN THE MILITARY. DO WE REPORT OUR INCOME DIFFERENTLY? Your basic pay and cash bonuses must be reported as income. If you get any cash value allowances for off-base housing, food, clothing, it must also be included as income. However, if your housing is part of the Military Housing Privatization Initiative, do not include your housing allowance as income. Any additional combat pay resulting from deployment is also excluded from income.
- 15. MY FAMILY NEEDS MORE HELP. ARE THERE OTHER PROGRAMS WE MIGHT APPLY FOR? To find out how to apply for SNAP or other assistance benefits, contact your local assistance office or call 1-800-342-3009.

How to Apply: To get free or reduced price meals for your children, carefully complete one Application for Free and Reduced Price School Meals/Milk, following the instructions on the form, for your household and return it to the designated office listed on the application. All household members and children should be listed on one application.

- If you receive SNAP or TANF benefits or participate in the FDPIR, the application must include the children's names, the household SNAP,
 TANF or FDPIR case number and the signature of an adult household member.
 - Contact your local Department of Social Services for your SNAP or TANF case number, if necessary.
 - No application is necessary if the household was notified by the School Food Authority that their children have been directly certified based on Assistance Program participation. If the household is not sure if their children have been directly certified, the household should contact the school.
- If you do not list a SNAP, TANF or FDPIR case number for any household member, the application must include the names of everyone in
 the household, the amount of income for each household member, how often it is received and where it comes from. It must include the
 signature of an adult household member and the last four digits of that adult's social security number or check the box if the adult does not
 have a social security number.
- An application for free and reduced price benefits cannot be approved unless complete eligibility information is submitted, as
 indicated on the application and in the instructions. We will let you know when your application is approved or denied.

Reporting Changes: The benefits that you are approved for at the time of application are effective for the entire school year and up to 30 operating days into the new school year (or until a new eligibility determination is made, whichever comes first). You no longer need to report changes for an increase in income or decrease in household size, or if you no longer receive SNAP.

Meal Service to Children with Disabilities: Federal regulations require schools and institutions to serve meals at no extra charge to children with a disability which may restrict their diet. A student with a disability is defined in 7CFR Part 15b.3 of Federal regulations, as one who has a physical or mental impairment which substantially limits one or more major life activities of such individual, a record of such an impairment or being regarded as having such an impairment. Major life activities include but are not limited to: functions such as caring for one's self, performing manual tasks, seeing, hearing, eating, sleeping, walking, standing, lifting, bending, speaking, breathing, learning, reading, concentrating, thinking, communicating, and working. You must request meal modifications from the school and provide the school with medical statement from a State licensed healthcare professional. If you believe your child needs substitutions because of a disability, please get in touch with us for further information, as there is specific information that the medical statement must contain.

<u>SNAP/TANF/FDPIR case number:</u> This must be the <u>complete</u> valid case number supplied to you by the agency including all numbers <u>and</u> letters, for example, E123456, or whatever combination is used in your county. Refer to a letter you received from your local Department of Social Services for your case number or contact them for your number.

Foster Child: A child who is living with a family but who is under the legal care of the welfare agency or court may be listed on your family application. List the child's "personal use" income. Important Community Education Information




