

A MESSAGE FROM YOUR SUPERINTENDENT

Greetings Barker Learning Community,

The start of the 113th year for the Barker Central School District is just around the corner. Before we know it, our students will be walking through our doors to start another year of learning. For those of you in the community who are sending your little ones in, no matter their age, make sure they get to bed early and get ready for school when it starts!

Lately it seems that we continually have been dealing with changes, either at the national, state, or local areas, and this year will be no different. As you know we have been continuing work on our large capital project. Nearly all exterior work will be completed prior to kids arriving at school on September 3rd.

One aspect of this work is the reconfiguration of our parking lots. Please make sure to see page 10 for detailed information on how we have adjusted the ways we access buildings on campus. The changes were made to increase safety for everyone and to align with future interior work.

A large portion of the planned window work was completed over the last two weeks of August and our new boilers are expected to be completed by the second week of September.

The centerpiece of our exterior work, the multipurpose field, will be complete and ready for use prior to our first games. In fact, the new turf field was fully installed by the first week of August with all of the remaining fencing being finished just prior to school starting.

We are extremely excited for what these renovations will bring to our students and community. The work being done here is for our students and residents to use and enjoy to the fullest. Any time these facilities are not in use for school-related purposes, our goal is to have our facilities accessible for everyone to use. Over the last couple years, we have also continued to improve what we do academically as well. We are proud to have been identified as one of the top 15 High Schools in the Buffalo region and in the top 15% nationally, as ranked by the US News and World Report. By the time our kids leave the doors of Barker Central, they are ready to go out into the world and be meaningful contributors to our larger society. It is clear we are continually meeting our mission and vision, and we look forward to doing even better, well into the future.

Please know that these achievements are made possible through the support of our entire community. FROM THE DESK OF MR. CARTER

Hello Barker Learning Community. Below is information about the voter-approved tax levy as well as details on paying property taxes.

The total tax levy for the 2024-2025 school year will be \$5,157,400, representing a 2.8% increase from last school year. Please understand that this does not mean your individual property tax bill will increase by the same percentage. This is due to each town's property valuations.

Tax bills are calculated and printed by Niagara County in mid-August and they will be mailed to you at the end of August. Please note the following when paying your tax bill:

1. Tax payments are due by September 30th without penalty. Payments are still accepted through October 31st, but there is a late penalty applied after September 30th.
2. The best way to pay your tax bill is to drop off your payment at the lock box outside of the District Office doors. This is at the parking lot next to the 1911 building. To the right is a picture of the lock box. This is checked several times a day and is the fastest way to ensure the district receives your payment.
3. You may also mail it to the PO box number that will be issued on your bill. However, please be aware of any delays that could occur with the postal service.
4. It can take up to 2-3 weeks to process your payment and bill. The reason for this is that we process all of our tax bills here in the district to save money. Many other districts contract this work out to a bank for an additional fee. We kindly ask that you hold any calls inquiring about the status of your tax payment for this duration.
5. Taxpayers can always check the status of their tax bill online at totalcollectionsolution.com/site/login. The username is "barker" and the password is "14012".
6. We do not accept cash payments for security and safety purposes.

More information regarding the approved budget and tax levy can be found on the district website under the "Business Office" section. Thank you for your continued support of the district.

We are only a few short days away from beginning the 2024-2025 school year together at Barker Central School. We are so excited to welcome back our students, teachers, and families back into our building for another year of top-notch learning opportunities! We will continue to focus on our goals laid out in the Strategic Plan:



- Increase Student Engagement in the Learning Process: Through a collaborative process, stakeholders will be empowered to improve student engagement in the learning process through continual improvement.
- Improve Literacy for all Learners to be prepared for the 21st Century: Through a collaborative process, stakeholders will create an environment that supports increased student literacy including reading, writing, comprehension, and communication in all forms.
- Improve Instructional Outcomes for all Students: To sustain and expand student academic success by collaboratively reviewing data and developing data-driven processes which continuously foster improvements in instructional areas that impact student learning and achievement.

There are a few important dates to share with you as we prepare for the 2024-2025 school year:

- Welcome Back Night for students in grades 1-12 will be on Wednesday, August 28th from 5:30 to 7:00 PM. This will allow students and their families to meet the teachers, drop off supplies, and become familiar with the expectations of the upcoming school year.
- 7th Grade Orientation will take place during Welcome Back Night on Wednesday, August 28th, from 5:30 to 6:00 PM in the auditorium. If you are a family with a student in 7th grade, please plan to attend. This event will provide information to families and students regarding the transition into the JH/HS.
- Pre-K and Kindergarten Meet the Teacher Day will be held on Thursday, August 29th from 1:00 to 2:30 PM. This will allow our littlest learners and their families to meet the teachers, drop off supplies, see the classroom, and get acquainted with the Pre-K and Kindergarten expectations.
- The first day of school is Tuesday, September 3rd for all students. We cannot wait to see you!
- Opening kick-off on the new turf field will be under the lights on Friday, September 6th (Varsity Football Game vs. Medina).
- Homecoming Celebrations will be held the week of Monday, September 23rd through Saturday, September 28th. Please save the date!!!

Experiential learning and hands-on opportunities, such as project-based learning, STEAM exploration, field trips, and engaging assemblies, are important ways to bring education to life for our students. These experiences directly align with our district's strategic goal of increasing student engagement in the learning process. When students are actively engaged, they are more likely to succeed academically and social-emotionally.

In the 2023-2024 school year, our staff and PTO went above and beyond to connect students to interactive learning opportunities through field trips to local Barker treasures like the town hall and the library, to educational Niagara County hot-spots like Niagara Falls, the Aquarium of Niagara, state parks, and even to our closest city centers like the Explore & More and Buffalo AKG museums in Buffalo and the Strong Museum in Rochester, as well as countless other opportunities like band and choral competitions and trips, and club sponsored trips. We even brought field trips in-house and offered STEM mystery opportunities for our elementary students.

Our Pratt Assembly Team, which is a collective of staff members in the elementary school with ties across the district, planned and executed several engaging and fun assemblies this year for our Barker Students. There were class competitions to win field trips, a BMX guest speaker who talked to the entire student body about being kind and working hard, an animal expert assembly - and, thanks to your at-home participation in the

NFL Play 60 program, our elementary students won a dance party assembly which focused on being the best versions of ourselves. Members of our Barker Team also partnered with Niagara County Sheriff's Office and our own Somerset Police and Barker Fire Department to create an interactive traffic safety fair for our 11th and 12th grade students.

Each moment we can provide experiential learning opportunities for our students it helps deepen their connection to learning, the surrounding community, and to each other - creating life-long learners right in front of our eyes. We hope to continue this momentum into the 2024-2025 school year. One of my favorite moments of last school year was listening to our Pratt students on Moving-up Day talk about their favorite memories from the year - so many of them mentioned these key moments where they truly felt connected to their learning experiences.

FROM THE DESK OF MR. LEARO

Welcome to the 2024-2025 school year. We missed you while you were gone on summer vacation but we're so happy you're back! We look forward to the start of another wonderful and exciting year at Barker. I would like share several important pieces of information with you regarding Special Education and McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act Information.

Our Instructional Services/Special Education Department is focused on supporting our diverse learners and fostering an inclusive culture within our schools and community. We are committed to a strong partnership with parents, families and school district personnel in the education of our children. Here at Barker we seek to educate the whole child in preparation for the transition into adulthood to support occupational and economic success as life-long learners. What is Special Education?

Special Education services are designed individualized or group instruction, special services, or programs to meet the unique needs of students with identified disabilities. Special Education programs and services are provided for eligible students, ages 3-21. If you believe that your school-age child may be in need of Special Education services and related programs, or young child (age 3 to school-age) may be in need of early intervention, screening and evaluation processes designed to assess the needs of the child and his/her eligibility are available to you.

Who can make a referral to Special Education?

A CSE (Committee on Special Education) or CPSE (Committee on Pre-School Special Education) referral is a written statement asking that the school district evaluate a child to determine if they need special education services. This written statement should be addressed to Mark Learo, and can either be hand-written or emailed (mlearo@barkerbsd.net). A referral to Special Education can be completed by a child's teacher, other school personnel or by you as the parent.

If you suspect that your 3, 4 or 5-year-old child, who has not yet entered kindergarten, has a disability and may need Special Education services, please contact me and I will assist with answering your questions about this process. For concerns about children under the age of 3, please contact the Niagara County Department of Health - Early Intervention program at 716-278-1691 or 716-278-8288.

What are the next steps after a referral has been made?

After a CSE/CPSE referral has been submitted, the committee will determine which evaluations are the most appropriate to conduct based on reported student needs. After the evaluation process is completed, parents will be invited to a meeting, as a member of the committee, to discuss the results. At the meeting, the committee will review the evaluation results. Based on that information, and information provided by the parents, the committee will decide if the child is eligible or ineligible to receive special education programs and/or services. In order to be eligible, a child must have a disability that affects their ability to learn. If the committee decides a child is eligible for services, they will identify the disability category and develop and implement an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) to meet the child's needs.

New York State Education Department McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act:



The McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act guarantees educational rights and supports for students experiencing homelessness, and seeks to remove any barriers these students may face in succeeding in school.

Under this act, homeless children and youth are defined as A. an individual who lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence; and B. includes children and youth who are sharing the housing of another person due to loss of housing, economic hardship, are living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, or camping grounds due to the lack of alternative adequate accommodations, are living in emergency or transitional shelters or who have been abandoned; C. children and youth who have a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for, or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodations for human beings; D. children and youth who are living in cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, or similar settings, and migratory children who qualify as homeless because they are living in any of the circumstances described previously.

McKinney-Vento provides protections that ensure children and youth are enrolled in school; have access to and receive educational services for which they are eligible; receive needed referrals to health care, dental care, mental health, substance abuse care, housing and other appropriate services; parents, guardians, and unaccompanied youth are fully informed of all transportation services available (including transportation to the school of origin, and are assisted in accessing transportation).

If you are experiencing 'homelessness' as defined above, please contact me to access any of the supports mentioned here.

Welcome back to the 2024-2025 school year at Barker Central. I hope everyone had a fun, safe summer and enjoyed doing whatever makes you happy.

Over the past few years, as schools have continued to recover from the pandemic, our students at Barker have thrived in their academic achievements. Proficiency rates on Regents exams at the secondary level hover around the 90-95% range with mastery rates (earning a score of 85 or higher on the exam) in the 40-50% range. It is numbers like these that have helped Barker rank high in comparison to other schools in Niagara and Orleans counties. Our graduation rate has also remained consistently strong and student attendance levels are closer to where they were prior to the pandemic.

Our faculty and staff have also continued to shine! During the past 18 months, nearly all of our faculty have created a rigorous, standards-based curriculum that will help our students continue to achieve at a higher level. Faculty have also embraced a new initiative that focuses on analyzing data in a clear, consistent manner to guide their instruction and keep student learning at the forefront of all that we do.

Barker is also pleased to announce that starting in the 2024-2025 school year, graduating seniors can earn an additional credential on their diploma by earning a Seal of Civic Readiness. To earn this credential, students must demonstrate academic excellence by earning high marks on the commencement level history exams and developing and presenting a project on an issue that impacts the local community.

As we finalize our preparations for the upcoming school year, Barker is focused on the following goals:

1. Increase Student Engagement in the Learning Process
2. To improve Literacy for all Learners to be prepared for the 21st century
3. Improve Instructional Outcomes for all students.

Over 125 students in grades PK-12 participated in the Summer School Program. The students in grades PK-8 received instruction in Math, ELA and Science. Students also had an opportunity to design artwork in Art Enrichment, play their favorite sports in Physical Education, create exciting projects in STEAM class, and participate in swim lessons as well as many more fun activities throughout the summer. Several high school students completed the necessary coursework in the Credit Recovery Program which allows those students to stay on pace for graduation.

The Challenger Learning Center out of Lockport also came to BCS to present the Mobile Planetarium experience. 2013 Barker graduate and Executive Director of the Challenger Learning Center, Michael Schian, gave an out of the world presentation! PARKING AND TRAFFIC CHANGES

As you know we have made a number of substantial changes to our parking lot areas as part of our ongoing capital project. The biggest changes made affect how the bus loops and the Elementary and District Office parking lots will flow. Please see the images on this page for these changes. The biggest daily change will impact those who pick up and drop off their students every day. Pick up and drop off (lower right) will occur in generally the same place as it has been the last couple years, but the entry and exit to the pick up and drop off loop has been moved to Quaker Road. This change allows for pick up and drop off to occur on a rolling basis and not be impacted by the release of busses in the afternoon. This also completely removes the pick up and drop off process from those parking each day.


The second big change is we have created a separate parking area that will align with the building office suites being constructed in the old middle school area. The entry to this area utilizes the old bus loop to access this newly configured parking area. Our existing bus loop was also reconfigured to exit differently in order to separate a portion of our parking lots from the bus loop.

We hope the images on this page show how these new spaces will flow, but we will also have temporary signage posted in all the new areas to help guide everyone through the changes until our permanent wayfinding signage is installed later in the fall.

DAVID JOHNSON WINS HOLOCAUST CONTEST

On Tuesday, May 28th, the Holocaust Education Resource Organization of Buffalo and the judges of the 2024 Arts & Writing Contest recognized Barker Jr.-Sr. High School sophomore, David Johnson, at the HERO of Buffalo awards ceremony for his entry in the annual contest. Johnson (pictured at right with ELA teacher Mrs. Dudek) received 2nd place in the 10th grade writing category and was also named Best in Show in the high school writing category. The ceremony took place at Congregation Shir Shalom on Sheridan Drive in Williamsville.

David's poem, titled "Broken Hearts and Strong Souls," was published in the July/August edition of The Jewish Journal. This prestigious honor showcases Barker Central School District as an outstanding beacon among all Western New York Schools. In recognition of this, our District has been awarded \$250.00 to be used for Holocaust related educational materials.



Mrs. Dudek stated, "Thank you David for representing our District in such a profound way: promoting human rights, social justice, and civic responsibility."

Students were tasked with describing the challenges faced by parents and/or children of the Kindertransport. The Kindertransport (German for children's transport) took place between 1938 and 1940 and involved a series of rescue efforts. Thousands of refugee children, mostly Jewish, were rescued from Nazi Germany and moved to Great Britain.

This year marked the 85th anniversary of Kindertransport! Submissions for the writing contest required the following criteria: Entries could be fiction or non-fiction writing, such as poetry, journal entries, editorials, letters, or short stories. Writing entries could be a maximum of 750 words. All copyright-protected sources had to be cited and a bibliography of all sources was required to accompany all research entries.


GANCASZ WINS FREEDOM ISN'T FREE POSTER CONTEST
